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Pursuit of Excellence

Listen up Risk Reduction and Social Chairmen! The Pursuit of Excellence <u>Self-Assessment Booklet</u> is due April 30th.

This means you need to start preparing appropriate supporting documentation to attach to your chapter's Pursuit of Excellence submission, as well as begin asking the appropriate officers what other resources they need from you. Some items you should be preparing are your chapter's Social Calendar, Risk Reduction Implementation Plan, and Crisis Management Plan.

This is also a great opportunity to engage the membership in a conversation about the chapter's risk reduction policies and plans. Be sure the chapter utilizes the <u>Self-Assessment</u> <u>Session</u> so that you can discuss the chapter's programs and progress in all areas this year.

Relationship Agreements

Increasingly, colleges and universities are requiring student organizations, primarily fraternities and sororities, to execute a relationship agreement – also referred to as a recognition statement – as a condition to be recognized by the host institution. In most cases, that university recognition allows chapters to reserve university rooms, market events on-campus and participate in IFC functions, among other benefits. Needless to say, university recognition has a lot of benefits so chapters are more than willing to sign these recognition agreements when asked.

While most recognition agreements outline reasonable expectations and policies, some of these agreements contain inequitable requirements related to insurance and legal liability. In many cases, our insurance policy cannot meet the insurance-related requirements outlined in the relationship agreement. To ensure your chapter is not agreeing to requirements the General Fraternity cannot meet or to expectations that are unreasonable or unfair, you should email the recognition agreement immediately upon receipt to Fred Dobry, Director of Risk Reduction, at fred.dobry@sigmanu.org for review.

Your chapter should never execute a relationship agreement and/or recognition statement until it has been properly reviewed by the General Fraternity. In almost all situations, the General Fraternity is able to work with the host institution to make mutually agreeable changes to the recognition agreement so that all parties are comfortable with the terms.

Facebook's Role in Risk Management

Many of us enjoy the benefits of being a member of Facebook. From keeping up-to-date on your friends' latest status updates to making sure you remember your chapter members' birthdays, we all use Facebook to some degree to keep our social life in order. Over the last several months, chapters are increasingly using Facebook to keep their social calendar in order too.

There have been several instances brought to the General Fraternity's attention of chapters creating Facebook event pages to market their social events. While we encourage chapters to take advantage of social networking opportunities, our members must be aware that Facebook invites are considered open social functions—a practice that could void the chapter's insurance coverage. Open Event Page = Open Party (continued from page 1)

The Fraternity's <u>*Risk Reduction Policy and Guidelines*</u> prohibits chapters from hosting "open" parties. Each chapter social function where alcohol is legally present is to have a guest list that is pre-approved by the chapter. Also, the overall maximum guest-to-member ratio for these events is not to exceed 2:1. There are two primary reasons for this:

- 1. Guests who are not friends with any chapter members may not respect the rules the chapter has in place for the event and/or the venue at which the event is being held. They have no reason to keep the chapter's welfare in mind since they have no true connection to the chapter.
- 2. A social function exceeding this ratio has been deemed unsafe due to the inability a chapter may have in maintaining proper oversight and crowd control should a fight or other similar incident occur.

So talk with your Social Chairman and ensure that the next chapter social event does not make its way onto Facebook. After all, don't you have more fun with your friends rather than random strangers?

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
