Headline: Ask An Aztec: Jeremy Caplan Author/Byline: Ryan Schuler Summary (Teaser): This Aztec for Life works in Boeing's Huntsville Design Center in Alabama.

Jeremy Caplan graduated from San Diego State University in 2014 with a bachelor's degree in mechanical engineering. After graduation, he spent the first 15 months of his career in Phoenix working on the Apache Attack Helicopter.

Earlier this year, he received the opportunity to relocate to Alabama to work for Boeing's Huntsville Design Center, where he is currently a structural design engineer. In his first two months in Huntsville, he provided support to Boeing's CST-100 Starliner, a crewed capsule designed to taxi astronauts to and from the International Space Station.

Currently, he is supporting the Exploration Upper Stage of the Space Launch System (SLS), which is NASA's next-generation heavy lift rocket. According to Caplan, SLS will take heavy payloads and humans to beyond earth destinations such as Mars.

1. Tell us the highlights of your professional career. What are your proudest achievements?

My proudest achievements include interning with NASA at the Jet Propulsion Laboratory in Pasadena, creating my own opportunities to network with Boeing leaders at the company's international headquarters in Chicago, and contributing to the development of the Space Launch System. I remember watching a test-fire of the solid rocket booster for SLS when I lived in Phoenix, and thinking about how cool it would be to work on it. I had no idea that just months later I would get the chance.

2. If you were to give current SDSU students some professional advice, what would you say?

Get comfortable being uncomfortable. The best opportunities push you slightly to moderately beyond your comfort level, and that's a good thing because it forces you to grow. Always challenge yourself and develop a mindset of continual growth and progression, and you'll be amazed at what is possible.

3. How do you stay connected to SDSU?

I mentor engineering students through the Aztec Mentor Program. The guidance and support I received though AMP as a student was incredibly helpful in navigating my transition from school to the workplace, and I am extremely happy to be able to pay it forward.

4. Why did you choose SDSU?

At the time I applied, I knew nothing about SDSU or San Diego in general. I originally intended to stay in Nevada for college, but while applying to a different CSU, I saw SDSU on the list of schools on the online application portal. I just knew San Diego was a big city and that excited me, so I decided to apply. When I toured SDSU's campus after being accepted, I fell in love with the campus and San Diego just felt right to me.

5. What's your favorite college memory?

My favorite college memory is graduation. I loved being able to share that moment with the most important people in my life. Also, getting to know all of the amazing people I met throughout my time at SDSU is another favorite memory of mine. I feel incredibly lucky to have such an exceptional group of friends from SDSU, and miss all of the good times we shared together. Within my group of closest friends, everyone brings something unique to the table, and I have always appreciated the balance of their perspectives and personalities.

6. Who was your favorite professor and/or what was your favorite class?

Richard Ayala's course in heat transfer was very interesting, and I really enjoyed Professor Ayala's personality and sense of humor. Morteza Mehrabadi, the dean of the College of Engineering, was always super supportive, and he is doing great things with the engineering department.

7. What experiences at SDSU helped you grow professionally?

The Aztec Mentor Program provided me with the opportunity to network with an engineering manager at NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory. My mentor, Jordan Evans, recommended me to his colleagues for a summer internship, and during the summer of 2014, I spent 10 weeks interning for JPL. That internship experience has really been the foundation of my career, and paved the way for everything that has followed since then. There aren't many days that go by that I don't think about the impact that my AMP mentor has had on my life, and how grateful I am for his help. Participating in AMP and choosing him as a mentor continues to be one of the best decisions I've ever made.

8. Who was your "SDSU family?" What clubs, organizations or teams were you a part of?

Greek life was a large part of my college experience. I attribute a lot of my growth in college to being a member of Sigma Nu Fraternity, and feel I would definitely not be the same

person without the experiences it provided me. I also grew to be very close friends with the ladies of Kappa Delta Sorority during my time at SDSU, so I consider them a vital part of my SDSU family as well.

Sigma Nu Alumni Club San Diego by

The original Sigma Nu Alumni Club of San Diego was founded in the early 1920s. As Jeff Giarde wrote in his *Early History Eta Kappa Chapter Sigma Nu Fraternity & Sigma Delta Phi*, "...[the Alumni Club] is an integral part of the story of Sigma Delta Phi and Eta Kappa Chapter. The Alumni Club played a key role in the road from Sigma Delta Phi to Eta Kappa Chapter of Sigma Nu Fraternity."

The qualification for membership was simply to be an alumnus of any Sigma Nu chapter. It was intended to be a social organization for Sigma Nu alumni and that was its primary function. Skipping through a lot of history, the Alumni Club became interested in Sigma Delta Phi in 1961 and the wheel had been set in motion toward February 23, 1963 when we became Eta Kappa Chapter of Sigma Nu Fraternity.

This also became the beginning of the end of the Alumni Club. The Eta Kappa Alumni Chapter was formed mostly by the Alumni Club brothers. Once the Eta Kappa Alumni Chapter was chartered, the Alumni Club and the Alumni Chapter blurred into a single organization run by Alumni Club members. But as more and more Eta Kappa alumni

became members of the Alumni Chapter and began running the chapter with emphasis on the Active chapter, the older Alumni Club members drained away, and unfortunately, so did the San Diego Alumni Club.

That brings us to 2017 and Jack Stevenson, our first Alumni Advisor and a member of the original Sigma Nu Alumni Club of San Diego. Jack wanted to start the Alumni Club back up and sent out an email asking for a show of interest to a number of Sigma Nu brothers living in San Diego County. I believe he got 34 so far who want to be part of the organization.

The Sigma Nu Alumni Club, San Diego is now registered with National. They have had their first social function at the Handlery Hotel in Mission Valley. Following is the write-up of the evening by Jack Stevenson:

Gentlemen, we reinitiated the San Diego Club on Wednesday, March 15th, at 5:30 pm at the Handlery Hotel in Mission Valley by gathering 18 Sigma Nu's from 10 different Chapters and our guest, Spencer Montgomery, Senior Vice President, Sigma Nu Educational Foundation, Inc.

The spirit of Sigma Nu filled the room instantly. Spencer offered a wealth of information about the fraternities activities and programs, particularly the Mentor Program. Several expressed interest in providing this service and I followed up on that with Tim Braddick, Director of Fraternal Operations. Tim advised that Justin Wenger, Director of Member Engagement was the conduit to that program - and immediately Justin emailed several links for those interested in becoming a Mentor to follow. Don Colapinto, Zeta Upsilon, Arizona State, rang in early, and I hope will be the focus for coordinating this opportunity with Justin and all the San Diego Alumni Club members.

Ideas flourished about having two Alumni Club events each year, which most of us present seemed to support. 'Beer & Brats' and a Padre baseball game were suggested. Jim Stark, Eta Kappa, San Diego State, offered to contact the Diamondback's owner to see if a September date with that team would be appropriate for our 2nd gathering this year. Keep Wednesday, September 20, 2017 open for this one should it all work out. The top floor of the Western Metal Supply building is usually provided for such events. You will be notified as soon as the ink dries.

We heard from Spencer, as an update to statistics, that there are currently - 150 Active Chapters, 17 in California. There are 26 Division Commanders and , if memory serves me correctly, 13 Alumni Clubs.

A self introduction - currently engaged activity - meet and greet - session continued until about 8:00 pm. Thank you all for getting this venture airborne.

A Piece of the Past and an Eye to the Future

The above photo was taken at a dinner meeting of the San Diego Sigma Nu Alumni Club. To the left is Jack Stevenson ($\Delta\Sigma$ 402, Carnegie Mellon Univ.), in the center is Fred Graf (Δ O 45, Univ. of Idaho) and to the right holding a plaque is Arthur C. Wells (BW 176, UC Berkeley). Jack Stevenson was very active in the Alumni Club and is a very successful San Diego architect and retired Navy officer. Today Jack is still helping out Eta Kappa. Fred Graf retired from the oil business and Art Wells was a high ranking San Diego banker. Both are deceased. On the back in pencil is the date 1966 in my handwriting. I would have guessed the photo was earlier and it could have been. Neither Jack nor I know what the plaque was for but probably an award to Art Wells who was a significant figure in the Alumni Club in many ways.

Art Wells received countless kudos over the many years for his dedication to Sigma Nu and the Alumni Club. He was one of the founders of the San Diego Sigma Nu Alumni Club in the early 1920s. Art was a senior bank executive for San Diego Trust & Savings Bank. He served the Alumni Club as the perennial treasurer. Beginning in the later 1940s Art was overtly the sole alumnus in San Diego consistently seeking a Sigma Nu chapter at San Diego State. After WWII many local fraternities and sororities were formed at San Diego State. Some of them grew into large chapters with many alumni. In the latter 1940s Art tried on multiple occasions to convince the High Council to use one of the local fraternities to form a Sigma Nu chapter. Art interacted with some of the local fraternities, some of which had many active and alumni members and were good potential Sigma Nu candidates. He recommended those locals he felt were worthy. All were rejected by the High Council! By 1953 there were no locals left as they had all become chapters of national fraternities and it was the same for the sororities. The idea of a Sigma Nu chapter at SDS died. In 1960 when Sigma Nu Executive Secretary Richard R. Fletcher visited with alumni members in San Diego the only school they saw as available for possible future colonization was U.C. San Diego which was in its very early stages. It would not be until 1985 that Sigma Nu would come to U.C. San Diego which, apparently, bans fraternity houses.

In late 1960 Art learned of the Sigma Delta Phi local fraternity at San Diego State. He got excited again. He proved to be one of the strongest supporters of Sigma Delta Phi becoming a chapter of Sigma Nu. Fortunately it happened before Art died. In the photo above we do not know what the award was for that Art is holding. If anyone knows its whereabouts or it is found somewhere, please let me or Jim Stark know. It likely went to his family and that would take a lot of detective work just to find it and we don't even know what is on it! My guess is the plaque had something to do with Art's part in helping Sigma Delta Phi become Eta Kappa Chapter of Sigma Nu Fraternity but it also could have been a tribute to his many decades of dedication to Sigma Nu and the Alumni Club.

The man in the center of the threesome is Fred Graf. He had a nice home on Euclid Avenue with a swimming pool and a pool house. Many times over the years the members of the San Diego Sigma Nu Alumni Club had parties at Fred's house. The active chapter also had some parties there. Fred was one of the early members of his chapter in Idaho where he was also the E.C. He, like Art, clearly loved Sigma Nu. Both Art and Fred were strong and helpful regarding Sigma Delta Phi and Eta Kappa Chapter.

Jack Stevenson, to the left, was our first Alumni Advisor. When we were discovered by the San Diego Sigma Nu Alumni Club Jack was just going out of office as the President. He was followed by Dr. Edward H. Hashinger who was a Past Regent of Sigma Nu. Dr. Hashinger played a key role behind the scenes with national which was of immense value to us in becoming a Sigma Nu chapter. It also helped when we bought the Montezuma Road property and needed a loan from national.

Jack Stevenson was a piece of gold for the young men of Sigma Delta Phi and Eta Kappa. Jack began attending Sigma Delta Phi meetings occasionally starting in the spring of 1961. Our relationship with Jack became a trustworthy friendship. During that first semester with Sigma Nu now on our radar we actually rejected several lucrative offers to take over two failing fraternities at SDS. It was tempting but we were about brotherhood a lot more than material things. Put another way, our principles trumped our greed!

Jack became our first Chapter Advisor and I was his first Eta Kappa subordinate chapter advisor. When Jack left the position in 1968 to work on the 200th Anniversary of San Diego I became the Chapter Advisor until I moved from San Diego in 1971 to take a position with the California Court of Appeal. One of the bad things in those days was poor communications so that if you moved away you generally lost most of your contact with those in San Diego. Long distance telephone calls were considered expensive in those days and there were was no internet and cell phones. Those who moved away often lost their connection with Sigma Nu in San Diego and I was one of them. One of the important aspects of our Alumni Chapter today is that you can be a part of it whether you live in San Diego, Miami, France or China.

We should all know our roots. We should all think positively about our fraternity and its future. We should all continue to support our fraternity as best we can whether it is with time, effort or money. We have collegians now to consider. This is our second, and possibly last, chance for our Eta Kappa active chapter to thrive and survive again. The same is true for our Eta Kappa Alumni Chapter and our house corporation, Montezuma Mesa Properties. For those who can, support and help are valuable necessities. Not everyone can pitch in with a lot of time or tons of money but we still should all support our fraternity as best we can with whatever talents, time and resources we can afford to give. That decision is up to you, not me.
